The Northwest Region of Conservation

Districts teamed up to host a Consultant

Workshop at the Trinity Point Church of
God in Clarion County. Around 100 people
attended the workshop ranging from firms
located as far as Pittsburgh to State College.

The workshop began with an introduction from Dana Hannibal of Clarion Conservation District. Dana discussed updates on permitting requirements and common deficiencies seen on plans received by the Districts.

Monroe County Conservation District made the trek west to present at the workshop. Professional Engineers Michael Wilk and

Drew Wagner spoke on infiltration testing, discharge points and points of interest, off-site discharge and undetained areas. There were many questions that sparked good discussion among the attendees and the presenters.

Since we were ahead of schedule, Maria of the

Dirt, Gravel and Low Volume Road Studies Program presented on stream crossings. Stream crossings are often included in designs and it is important to discuss requirements and potential issues with crossings.

Wrapping up the workshop was Monroe County's final presentation. MCCD staff discussed Post Construction Stormwater Management (PCSM) modules that are included in permit applications and Managed Release Concept (MRC) calculations spreadsheet.

The workshop was a success, with lots of great discussion and talking points.



Elk County Awarded PACD Mini Grant for Adult Environmental Education Programs

St. Marys, PA — The Elk County Conservation District received funding from the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts (PACD) to host two adult education workshops. The purpose of these grants are to educate adults on non-point source pollution. For the soil testing workshop, the District plans to partner with NRCS. Soil health, proper soil nutrients, recommended fertilizer additions and methodology for reducing non-point source pollution during fertilizer application and tilling/planting will be discussed. Attendees will also receive a soil test kit. At the rain barrel workshop, participants will learn about stormwater stressors throughout watersheds and the actions homeowners can take to reduce their stormwater impacts to local streams and rivers. Each participating household will receive a rain barrel to install at their home.

Pollution Control Projects Funded in Elk County

Twenty-eight County Conservation Districts Received Funding to Promote Water Pollution Prevention Strategies across Pennsylvania

(St. Marys, PA)— Elk County Conservation District received \$2,850 to host a rain barrel workshop and a soil testing workshop for Elk County residents.

"With this grant money, the district will have the opportunity to hold educational events for adults on topics of interest to our communities. This project will help citizens in our county do their part to make a difference for clean water and healthy soil," said Kate Wehler (District Manager).

Education and outreach about the project is expected to begin in May of 2023 for the rain barrel workshop, and January of 2024 for the soil testing workshop. The district expects to have the project work begin no later than June of 2023 for the rain barrel workshop, which is when the District is hoping to hold this workshop. workshop at the Elk Country Visitor Center.


This year's workshop focus was ABACT (Antidegradation Best Available Combination of Technologies) BMPs, which are required in special protection watersheds. A large portion of Elk County has special protection watersheds, which includes High Quality (HQ) and Exceptional Value (EV) streams and wetlands.

The workshop began with an introduction to Conservation Districts: what they are, why they were created, and programs covered. Many people confuse Districts with other state agencies, so it was important to provide insight on who we are and what we do.

The permitting process requires reporting

different information, such as soil indices and stream designations. District staff presented on these topics.

Mike Zock of MKB Innovations wrapped up the workshop by presenting on various products offered by the company. He discussed new technology, mainly regarding silt fence and inlet filters,

where the material is capable of absorbing oil and other liquids found on construction sites.

Kersey Farm Reaches Century Farm Status

On April 27th, the owners of Earleyville Farm on Hayes Road in Kersey were awarded Century Farm Status. This is awarded to farms owned by the same family for 100 consecutive years. On April 27th, 1923, Giovanni Mattiuz bought the property for a total price of \$5,500. The farm raised chickens, milk cows, and a few hogs, which in 1957 were all sold or eaten and the farm was converted to a crop farm.

The current owners are Ernest Mattiuz Jr., Cecelia Mattiuz Bona, and Thomas Mattiuz. Ernest Jr. and Ceclia built their houses on the land and currently still reside there. Ernest Jr. and Cecelia's son, Micheal Bona, works on the farm daily now and Micheal Bona is the fourth generation to work on the farm.

Congratulations to the Mattiuz family for this amazing accomplishment.

ECCD Welcomes New Agriculture Conservation Assistance Program (ACAP) to the County



The Agricultural Conservation Assistance Program (ACAP) is a state funded reimbursement grant program for an individual financially responsible for an agriculture operation or an individual who lives on a property on which agricultural operation takes place. Projects that are implementing Best Management Practices (BMPs) are eligible. All applicants must have at least one of the following types of plants to be eligible: an agricultural erosion and sediment control plan, a conservation plan, a manure management plan, or a nutrient management plan. Three schools, with a total of 40 students, participated in the Elk County Senior Envirothon competition. The competition was held at the Elk Country Visitor Center. The participating schools included Elk County Catholic, St. Marys Area High School, and Ridgway Area High School. The students were tested on aquatics, forestry, soils, wildlife, and an environmental issue category that is changed yearly. This year, the current issue topic was "adapting to a changing climate." A Study Day was held April 3rd at the Elk Country Visitor Center as well. Local industry professionals attended this event to instruct the students on the above mentioned topics.

Team Kickin' Grass from St. Marys Area High School won the county competition, moving on the represent the county in the 39th annual state event. Team Lettuce League took second place, also from St. Marys Area High School. There was only a six point difference between first and second place! Elk County Junior Envirothon

Bendigo State Park, Johnsonburg, PA— On April 19th, students from Elk County schools met to challenge one another during the Junior Envirothon Competition. This competition is locally-based and was created by the Elk County Conservation District to help prepare students in grades 6-8 for the Senior Competition, which they can participate in during high school.

This year, Junior Envirothon students were tested on topics of Aquatics, Forestry, Wildlife and Soils. As part of the forestry exam, students focused on the spotted lanternfly. The spotted lanternfly is an invasive plant hopper, native to China, that has been making its way across the state. The students learned the threat of this species and how important it is to stop the spread.

Overall, 7 teams for a total of 28 students from the St. Marys Area Middle School and Elk County Catholic Middle School participated in the event. Team Fruit Salad, from SMA Middle School, took first place for the second year in a row! Second place was awarded to team The Lorax, also from SMA Middle School.

We are quickly approaching the time of the year where bug spray and sunscreen are a must! You may be wondering, are these items recyclable? While these items can be thrown in your household trash, it is always good to recycle when possible!

Commonly, sunscreen and bug

spray come in aerosol cans or plastic containers. If you purchased

an aerosol can, the Recycling Center can accept these items anytime. If you have a plastic container that is empty and is a type of plastic they accept, you can bring this in anytime as well. If you have a plastic container with bug spray or sunscreen left, these items will have to be saved for the annual household hazardous waste collection coming up on August 26th this year from 9-12!
